The Kingdom of Sin

Introduction

Initial Sin (cf. Genesis 2:25 and Genesis 3:7)

At the culmination of the creation story, at the end of chapter 2, we read the following:

"... the man and his wife, both of them, were naked [עֲרוּמִּים], and they were not ashamed" (Genesis 2:25)

So, Adam and Eve are innocent, have no shame, and are in an intimate relationship; however, after their rebellion against Yahweh the first thing we read is this:

"... the eyes of both of them were opened, and they knew that they were naked [עֲרוּמִׁים]. And they sewed together fig leaves and they made for themselves coverings." (Genesis 3:7)

Finally, at the end of Genesis 3, we read...

"... the Lord God sent him out from the garden of Eden to work the ground from which he was taken. ²⁴ He drove out the man, and at the east of the garden of Eden he placed the cherubim and a flaming sword that turned every way to guard the way to the tree of life." (Genesis 3:23-24)

Sin in Community — Exodus 3:14

Later on in the biblical story, when God reveals himself to Moses on Mt. Sinai, Yahweh says this:

"Yahweh! ... I forgive iniquity, rebellion, and sin. But I do not excuse the guilty. I lay the sins of the parents upon their children and grandchildren; the entire family is affected even children in the third and fourth generations." (Exodus 3:14)

James says in his letter:

"... confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working." (James 5:15-17)
